We are delighted to introduce your new-look, 8-page newsletter, appearing every month from 1 August for a 12-month trial period. As ever, it will be delivered to 2,000 homes or more by volunteers – now drawing on the energies of the Covid-19 network, like our news sheets in early April.

- Our regular delivery team – many of them retired and in a high-risk category – effectively came to a standstill in March. We are greatly in their debt for years of dedicated support.
- Concerns that the virus might spread through paper put all our print on hold in April. However, we are heartened by medical advice that any risk is eliminated in 72 hours. Do pass on this message to anyone who is still wary if you can.

The Covid-19 effect

While most recreation and social activities ground to a halt in March, ‘virtual’ substitutes have taken off and our great outdoors has come into its own. Around the village – more usefully for residents who don’t go online – our local businesses have been continually innovating, with door or window service, takeaways and free delivery – and improved outdoor spaces too. They deserve our support more than ever as we adjust to the ‘new normal’; and we all have good reason to help keep them going.

Onwards and upwards?



Garden Village plans are finally on the doorstep – 198 hefty documents from Grosvenor, conveniently timed for holiday reading at bit.ly/OCGV-out

‘Outline application with means of access for a mixed-use Garden Village, comprising residential, retail, food and drink, health and community facilities, hotel, class B1, B2 and B8 employment uses, education provision, burial ground, public open space with sports pitches together with ancillary facilities, landscaping and associated infrastructure and works.’

As we go to press, the District Council’s own Garden Village Area Action Plan (planning framework) is on course for approval on 29 July, with a six-week consultation due to run to mid-September. You can be sure of fuller coverage in our next issue!

What’s in a name? WODC’s recommendation, chosen at length from 115 offerings, is Salt Cross. Objections have been raised about the consultation process but there are probably bigger battles ahead.

West Eynsham planning documents and planning applications will follow shortly, no doubt. Meanwhile, Jansons Property report that online responses to their proposals for the area are 69% in favour of an access road which avoids the Chil flood plain.



Helping hands in a time of crisis

One of the greatest local success stories of the COVID-19 crisis has been the coming together of the Eynsham Heroes Coronavirus Support Network, says Laura Stringer.

The network was the brainchild of Sean Grace, who was keen to harness the community spirit in our village to co-ordinate help for our neighbours during this pandemic. It quickly grew into a Facebook group of over 600 volunteers, as well as 14 neighbourhood WhatsApp groups for mutual aid and – in some cases – discussion of local birdlife and clandestine flour dealing! A core team of administrators convenes regularly via Zoom but has yet to meet in person!

 In partnership with Eynsham Good Neighbour Network, the volunteers provide practical aid for anyone self-isolating, as well as assisting Eynsham Medical Centre with deliveries. Thanks to the hard work of Pam & Bob Thiele, the group has also helped to establish Eynsham Community Larder, which delivers over 25 weekly food parcels – including fresh milk, fruit and vegetables – to households in need. The service is largely funded by community donations but is now part-supplied by the Oxford Food Bank. There are food drop-off points in Co-op, Spar and The Market Garden.

Keep summer tidy! The volunteers are now also responding to the pandemic litter problem. If you'd like to help keep our communal areas, riverside, Fishponds and woodland paths clean over the holidays, you and your friends or family can borrow a litter picking stick and refuse bag hoop – kindly loaned to us by the regular Eynsham Litter Pickers – and join the socially-distanced summer clean up on Wednesdays and Sundays, or whenever you fancy. From the Clerk's desk

An update from Katherine Doughty, Clerk to Eynsham Parish Council (EPC) – see page 7 for contact details.

Coronavirus: We would like to sincerely thank Eynsham Good Neighbour Network and related volunteers who have helped residents over the past difficult months.

Play Areas: We are working our way through the Government guidelines and repair tasks to allow us to reopen these as quickly as possible – Old Witney Road reopened on 15 July. In the meantime, we continue to ask everyone to stay out of other areas. You can track our progress at bit.ly/EPCplay

Respect your community: An inspection of Old Witney Road play area on the morning of Saturday 11 July found a huge amount of 'Birra Morreti' glass bottles deliberately smashed on the basketball court. Litter had been left from a BBQ at Oxford Road Playing Field (south) that same weekend. Councillors, contractors and residents are routinely clearing a disgusting amount of rubbish left in our areas. Please put our rubbish in the nearest bin or take it home.



Reopening the Village Centre: We have been working with West Oxfordshire District Council (WODC) toward this. The aim is to help remind everyone about social distancing; and to promote the safety of cyclists and pedestrians by reducing traffic in the centre and creating a temporary 20mph speed limit across the village – see bit.ly/EPCVillage

We have also been liaising with Eynsham Retail Group to help promote local shopping, by creating timed parking bays and a loading bay. The details are now open to public consultation – deadline for responses is 7 August. Please follow the link from our consultation page bit.ly/EPC-asks

Planning: Feedback is still welcome on Jansons' West Eynsham masterplan and housing development proposal. Grosvenor's outline planning application for the Garden Village is online (ref 20/01734/OUT) with 198 supporting documents – deadline for comment 13 August. At the same time, WODC is consulting on its Garden Village Area Action Plan and other documents [page 1 and below]. Please respond to the consultations: we shall provide links in due course at bit.ly/EPCplanning

Eynsham's Nature Recovery Network:

We continue liaising with the network to help implement recommended maintenance practices. We anticipate preparing a new grass cutting specification for implementation from March 2021 over the next 3 years as we enter new maintenance contracts.

Wharf Stream Way: While most of this trail uses public rights of way, the section from the Mead Lane turn-off to Wharf Stream footbridge is currently only 'permissive', so walkers could be prevented from using it. The Council is now pursuing a 'Definitive Map Modification Order' to protect the permissive section. We need evidence from people who walked the path before 1992, when permission was provided (use must be over 20 years). Have your say

Community Infrastructure Levy: The CIL is a developer contribution to public amenities in the area. It is due upfront when planning permission is granted (while S106 is payable as houses are built and must relate to that development).

WODC is proposing 0% rating for major projects, including the Garden Village and West Eynsham developments. Your district councillors Carl Rylett and Dan Levy oppose zero rating, because key infrastructure is needed as Eynsham grows. 'We are sure that there is more than enough gain being made by landowners and developers for an additional CIL contribution to be affordable.' A greener future?

One of the positives of the lockdown has been getting to know and value our local area and thinking about how we can tread more lightly on the planet, says Sarah Couch.

GreenTEA is working hard for a green future and we think the tide is beginning to turn. WODC has asked residents if we think climate change is important and they seem to have got the message. We have been in touch with the Cabinet Member for Climate Change and their Area Action Plan (planning framework for the Garden Village) looks ambitious at first sight. It will need close scrutiny – and the teeth to deliver.

Meanwhile, we have secured funding via the Low Carbon Hub and Project LEO (Local Energy Oxfordshire) for a community powered Smart and Fair Futures Inspiration Panel to inspire the best and hold developers and councils to account. We are also embarking on a Smart and Fair Neighbourhood project to deliver smart clean energy to benefit the whole Eynsham area. Eynsham's Nature Recovery Network

has secured a grant from TOE (the Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment) to restore areas of Eynsham for wildflowers, *writes Catriona Bass*. TOE's Landfill Communities Fund is backed by Grundon Waste Management Ltd.

The 'dog-leg' of the playing fields near the Fishponds is first. Since spring, the grass has been left uncut and has grown into a fine hay crop, which Liam Barton of Long Hanborough is baling and taking to feed his herd of goats. Eynsham's Graham Podbery & Simon Webb of Evenlode Farm will prepare the ground, then spread wildflower seed from a local meadow.

Next spring, the first flowers will appear, around which paths will be mown for the enjoyment of playing-field goers. Fear not Carnival lovers! The meadow will be cut in time for the Carnival funfair.

The Nature Recovery Network is a network of individuals, community groups, local businesses and councillors in Eynsham and the surrounding villages dedicated to protecting and restoring our local nature in all its diversity.
